- Strategies to involve parents in home fire safety and how to work with local community fire service to promote fire education and prevention.

Workshop participants learn:

- How vulnerable young children are to fire and burn injuries.
- The surprising frequency of children's misuse of fire and their distorted perception and limited capacity to understand the potential danger of fire. Effective developmentally appropriate methods of teaching fire prevention to young children
- How to motivate children and families to change behaviors

The **play safe! be safe!** curriculum is the winner of the Director's Choice Award for Best Curriculum from Early Childhood News, a journal of the National Association for the Education of Young Children.

Each year the BIC Corporation provides grants to present 8 free *"play safe! be safe!*" workshops in the U.S. and Canada. Priority is given to communities which can demonstrate commitment to fire safety education and are able to provide a 'host' that helps with coordination and audience recruitment.
